Sen. Peter Welch interview

Rating: 4.1 out of 5

Summary of interview

Sen. Welch discussed the importance of local news, and the negative impact of its decline. He discussed his efforts to improve the USPS, which is especially important to local newspapers.

Comments on Sen. Peter Welch interview

- The Senator helped frame the stakes
- No substantial proposed solution.
- I've talked with Sen. Welch many times and often am the only reporter to attend appearances he makes in my town. But this was the longest I've heard him talk about the role local news plays in daily life and our democracy. I was skeptical I would hear something new, but pleasantly surprised at the detail he got into.

- I felt like he talked a lot about the importance of journalism. While I respect this, I am not the one in need of convincing.

Incentivizing Sustainability With Public Policy (Rebuild Local, Vermont Secretary of State, etc.)

Rating: 4.0 out of 5

Summary: Anna Brugmann, Director of Policy, Rebuild Local News discussed recent successful efforts to pass funding mechanisms for local journalism in New York, California and Illinois. Vermont State Senator Andrew Perchlik discussed the potential for state funding of local journalism in Vermont, saying direct funding is more likely than a tax break for journalism organizations. Vermont Secretary of State Sarah Copeland-Hanzas discussed her office's efforts to support local journalism.

Comments on the Public Policy panel

Press Forward panel (Press Forward National Director Dale Anglin, VCF President and CEO Dan Smith)

Rating: 4.2 out of 5

Summary: Dale Anglin discussed the new Press Forward initiative at the national level, and the effort to set up local chapters. She also talked about the need to help philanthropy and journalism to learn how to speak to one another. Dan Smith announced the state's new Press Forward chapter, while sharing the limits of the funding available. He said they were just beginning to determine their direction and asked for input from media leaders about how best to focus their efforts.

Comments on Press Forward panel

- Dale spoke in a way that reached a lot of people
- This is nice to see coming together in Vermont. It will be interesting to see what support there is in our relatively small philanthropic community to direct investment to news outlets.
- Need nuts and bolts of how and when to qualify.

- Taking time to connect with others in the field.


What could be improved upon for next year?

- Add breakout sessions
- Allow more time for questions of panelists.
- Add in some time to cover actual journalism, not just the business or journalism.
- A session where local media editors get to weigh in on the efficacy, usefulness, timeliness, accuracy of CNS stories.
- I was disappointed that many of the most powerful attendees had a private lunch room. The private luncheon leant an awkward vibe to the space that seemed anathema to our open media culture and transparency. It increases the sense of competition and scarcity mindset.
- I know this year was focused on the philanthropic/legislative side of things because of the recent Press Forward developments but I think there is a real need to go back to basics and talk about how to actually restore trust and support reporters in doing their jobs so they don't have to worry about money/animosity from the public/bad working conditions.
- More time to network and connect with other journos
- Nothing. This third edition built upon the momentum created by the previous two conferences. Just keep it going and help it grow stronger.


- Diversify the agenda a bit. This year seemed largely focused on finance to me. Funding is important but not the only challenge we collectively face.

What ideas for topics do you have for the next conference?

- reaching new audiences
- A segment where participants can propose solutions.
- Journalism alone will not resolve political divisiveness. I'd like to talk about how
 we can foster, model, and moderate discussions across difference about local
 issues.
- Hiring/retaining reporters in the long term (esp. financially but also making a healthier/more stable work environment), mental health/burnout coping for individuals and institutions, ways to find stories that resonate with readers on the local level (instead of just localizing a national issue it might be good to talk about how we can think/act differently than national reporters when finding stories)
- managing technical convergence and the collapse of media imposed length standards
- How can Vt journos collaborate to:
 - Encourage young people to study journalism
 - Train the next generation of journalists
 - Affect local and regional policy (as it applies to us) with a united voice
 - Cross-pollinate to better serve rural news deserts in Vt
- Pros and cons of becoming a nonprofit, vs having a nonprofit arm (as the Vermont Standard has done) vs staying a for-profit with a fiscal agent as Seven Days has done
- Convincing small news organizations that they will maintain autonomy with funding from Press forward.
- what does objective reporting look like when politicians lie?

- How can small local newspapers be rebuilt? Should there be a limit to how many papers a corporate behemoth or hedge fund can own?
- Workshops about nuts and bolts related to our work broken out to editorial/advertising/business.
